Our Journeys 50 YEARS AFTER THE FALL



On April 30, 1975, the 'Fall of Saigon' marked the defeat of South Vietnam after a long civil war in the country. During the days leading up to April 30, thousands fled, mostly through American organized evacuations, fearing what would happen to them and the country under the Communist regime. For the millions left behind, the suffering persisted long after the war's end.

The mass exodus of Vietnamese refugees began in 1975 and continued into the early 1990s, with a peak between 1979 and 1985. Nearly two million people attempted to escape during this period, though precise numbers remain elusive. Tragically, many did not survive the perilous journey; estimates suggest that as many as 600,000 people perished due to pirate attacks, rape, torture, persecution, drowning, and starvation. Around 800,000 to 1 million Vietnamese "boat people" successfully reached asylum countries. These refugees were fleeing in search of safety, shelter, and the basic human dignity that everyone deserves.

Vietnamese Boat People, a nonprofit organization, was founded as a tribute to the millions of refugees who fled Vietnam by boat. Today, it is dedicated to honoring and preserving the stories of the entire Vietnamese diaspora community.

Our Journeys 50 YEARS AFTER THE FALL

A traveling exhibition debuting in New York City in 2025

This exhibition commemorates the 50th anniversary of the Fall of Saigon, a pivotal moment in our Vietnamese diaspora community. 2025 will be a transformative year for Vietnamese people around the world filled with reflections on our journeys and how our families and communities have evolved.

We feel a sense of urgency with many stories and experiences being forgotten over the course of 50 years and even more at threat of being lost with our aging parents and elders. The exhibition is a thoughtfully curated show, drawing from over 250 stories we've collected. We aim to bridge past to present with narratives across different generations to foster a deeper understanding of the Vietnamese diaspora experience.

THE EXHIBITION IS THOUGHTFULLY CURATED AROUND THREE CENTRAL THEMES

Endurance and Flight

In the aftermath of the Fall of Saigon, Vietnamese citizens endured unimaginable hardships.

Decades of war and over a century of foreign rule had left Vietnam's land scarred, its infrastructure in ruins, and its industries underdeveloped. Our storytellers share their experiences under the new regime: farmlands, personal possessions, and private businesses were seized, and people were stripped of their livelihoods.

Many were condemned to brutal "reeducation camps," and citizens lived under constant surveillance, deprived of their freedom to act, think, and move freely, trapped in a state of fear.

Despite enduring such oppressive conditions, the stories highlight the unbroken spirit of hope among the Vietnamese people.

Adaptation and Identity

After treacherous journeys and spending months (sometimes years) at refugee camps living in poor conditions, many refugees struggled with cultural assimilation and post-traumatic stress.

The process of adaptation was not an easy one and was complicated even further when resettled into different cities across the United States where there were few Asian ethnic groups.

The stories featured explores the process of assimilation for these families and individuals. Especially for children of refugees who found themselves stuck in hybrid worlds, feeling neither connected to their past nor a sense of belonging in their present.

Intergenerational Impact and Moving Forward

Historically, the experiences of the Vietnamese diasporic community have been largely told from an outsider's perspective. While we have seen an increase in stories told by Vietnamese diaspora authors and filmmakers, many stories remain untold, not just in society but also within families.

Children continue to explore the meaning of their family's past and its impact on their lives today. Some families have thrived despite the adversity, while others continue to struggle, quietly bear the scars of the past.

Younger generations are reclaiming our narrative through intergenerational dialogue, retelling their family stories, and reinterpreting the impact. These stories are creating the representation that was previously absent, helping our community connect, heal, and move forward.


